## "FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR"

Okanogan County Child Development Association (OCCDA) has been providing services to children and families for over 50 years. OCCDA provides early childhood education and comprehensive, prevention-based services for children ages 0-5, pregnant women, and their families. OCCDA provides both classroom and home visiting services from ten service locations throughout Okanogan County and in Bridgeport.

OCCDA receives funding from the Office of Head Start to provide pre-school programs for children ages three to five and Early Head Start programs (home visiting and classroom options) for expectant parents and children from birth to the age of three. In 2016, OCCDA received "Duration" funding from the Office of Head Start for our Methow Valley Head Start program. This funding enabled us to implement a full day pre-school program in partnership with the Methow Valley School District during the 2017-2018 program year. In 2019, OCCDA received "Duration funding" from the Office of Head Start to expand Early Head Start Programs in Brewster, Omak, and Oroville and Head Start programs in Omak and Oroville to full day programs. This also resulted in the addition of a new facility in Oroville to house the Early Head Start program. This expansion was a result of OCCDA's work on community assessments and meetings with stakeholders and community members to assess the needs of these communities.

OCCDA receives state funding from the Washington State Department of Children, Youth, and Families Early Childhood Education and Assistance Program to provide pre-school programs in Tonasket and Oroville. OCCDA also receives federal Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV)funding from Washington State Department of Children, Youth, and Families to provide home visiting to expectant parents and children from birth to the age of three. All of OCCDA's programs are designed to promote school readiness, encourage positive parenting, improve maternal and child health, and promote child development.

In early 2018, OCCDA was approached by a community member passionate about literacy and Dolly Parton's Imagination Library Program. After due diligence and looking to the community for other potential partners, OCCDA decided that this program was a great fit. In 2019, OCCDA became an affiliate for Dolly Parton's Imagination Library Program and began enrolling children in March of 2019. This program provides a free, quality, age appropriate book every month to enrolled children ages birth to five living in Okanogan County and Bridgeport. During this program year, \$19,794.76 in donations allowed the program to serve 1022 children.

OCCDA provided services to 1,425 children and families during the 2019-2020 program year. Of those, 403 were enrolled in our early learning programs. 64% transitioned to kindergarten or to another early learning program.

Over the course of the last year and with our expansion, OCCDA has grown to 112 employees. For the third consecutive year, we hosted our summer interns. Our summer intern program is a competitive paid program providing summer internship opportunities for high school juniors and seniors and college students. We continue to look at ways to build interest in Early Learning careers and recruit qualified staff.

This year, our programs were significantly impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. As the Governor ordered schools closed, we were given the go ahead by Okanogan County Public Health to continue to operate and tried to keep some of our centers open. At that time, our decision making was focused on our three priorities.

- 1. The health and safety of our employees and the children and families we serve.
- 2. The health and safety of at risk individuals in our communities.
- 3. Balancing the economic impact on our employees and the families we serve.

Ultimately, all of our centers were closed, largely due to lack of available staffing. We took that time to intentionally develop virtual services for all enrolled children and families and to intentionally plan for safe re-openings at each of our centers. This included ensuring we were following state and local guidelines and recommendations and ECEAP, Head Start, and Childcare licensing requirements. The ability to secure adequate supplies, including personal protective equipment, disinfectants, and new classroom supplies played a role in re-open timelines. Other considerations included local case counts and staffing. As we move into the 2020 program year, our centers will be gradually re-opening. Families will be able to choose to continue the option of virtual services if their center is operating in person services. We have also invested in new platforms to expand and improve upon virtual services. We are working to ensure ALL families have access to needed technology. And, we are preparing to provide remote meals in areas that are otherwise unserved.

While we can't wait to see all of you in class, we want to be sure we continue to do everything we can to keep our employees, children and families we serve, and our communities safe. We also want to be sure we are offering options, so families can choose what the best method of service is for their family.


#### TRANSPORTATION:





#### Head Start and Early Head Start Enrollment by Month



### **FINANCIAL**

#### FINANCIAL AUDIT & PROGRAM REVIEWS

OCCDA contracts out annually for an independent financial audit. The financial audit for year-end December 2019 was performed by Cordell, Neher & Company, LLC. They issued a qualified opinion as noted below.

"In our opinion, except for the effects on the financial statements of not capitalizing the cost of equipment purchased and not recording mortgages incurred as discussed in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Okanogan County Child Development Association as of December 31, 2019 and 2018, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America."

The Department of Children, Youth, and Families performed a fiscal review of our Home Visiting (Rural Home Visiting) and ECEAP contracts for the period of July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2019. OCCDA was notified of the results in a letter dated June 23, 2020, which stated "We identified no exceptions during our review."

The Department of Children, Youth and Families (DCYF) performed a virtual site monitoring of our Home Visiting Contract (Rural Home Visiting Program) on April 16, 2020. As of this writing, the results of this site monitoring have not been received.

### PRE-SCHOOL PROGRAMS

OCCDA provides pre-school programs for children ages three to five through Head Start and the Early Childhood Education Assistance Program. OCCDA provides transportation or partners with local school districts (Tonasket and Methow Valley) to provide transportation to all children being served in pre-school programs.

#### **ECEAP AT A GLANCE**

#### **CHARACTERISTICS OF FAMILIES SERVED:**

- 74.5% of families served had income below 100% federal poverty line.
- 47.1% of families identified Spanish as the primary language of the home.
- 66.7% of parents/guardians have obtained less than a high school diploma.
- 15.7% of parents/guardians have completed sixth grade or less.

### PRENATAL TO THREE PROGRAMS

Both the Early Head Start and Rural Home Visiting Programs (MIECHV funding through the Washington State Department of Children, Youth, and Families) provide home-based home visiting programs to expectant parents and children ages birth to three. The programs use the same curriculum, Parents as Teachers, which is an evidence-based curriculum designed to provide parents with child development knowledge and parenting support, provide early detection of developmental delays and health issues, prevent child abuse and neglect, and increase children's school readiness. Creative Curriculum for Infants, Toddlers, and Twos is also utilized for both EHS and HS/ECEAP classrooms. Frequency and length of home visits depends on the program that children are accepted in and the needs of the child and family. RHV offers two home visits per month at one hour, if there are more children in the home that are being served or there are children with special needs the visit is an hour and a half. EHS Home Based programs offer weekly visits to families that last an hour and a half.

The Tonasket EHS Center Based program also offers an Early Head Start Combination program combining home visiting with two days of classroom time during the designated school year. In addition to offering the Parents as Teachers model, this program uses Creative Curriculum for Infants, Toddlers, and Twos in the classroom.

#### RURAL HOME VISITING AT A GLANCE

This project is funded through the US Department of Health and Human Services, Health Services and Resources Administration grant X10MC31177.

• 31% spoke Spanish as the primary language of the home.

• 39% of parents/guardians had less than a high school diploma.










#### % of Children Meeting/Exceeding Milestones

### **HEALTH & NUTRITION SERVICES**

OCCDA assists families to obtain medical and dental care, attend appointments, and advocate for themselves and their children. OCCDA provides education to families regarding wellness and prevention and contracts with a nurse consultant, a nutritionist, and mental health consultants to provide additional services to children and families.

OCCDA partners with local providers, including Family Health Centers and Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) programs to benefit families. These partnerships have enabled OCCDA to partner on dental screening for children and lead testing.

OCCDA also has a Health Services Advisory Committee made up of local professional and community representatives that provide guidance and oversight for Health and Nutrition needs.




#### **Completed Immunizations**




#### Children with Health Insurance

# COVID-19 PANDEMIC

#### HOW DID PARENT ACTIVITIES CHANGE/OPERATE DURING COVID-19?

Group connections were not held for a few months as we focused on how to deliver home visits and ensure families have access to and were provided with supplies. In June, we had our first Group Connection socialization and it was held through a zoom meeting. Head Start and ECEAP programs were unable to offer virtual parent activities at the beginning of our closure, but we created procedures to offer parent activities virtually beginning June 2020. Our staff offered a parent activity with a focus on providing information about COVID-19. In July, we offered a workshop about summery safety. As our new program year starts, staff will offer monthly virtual workshops/parent activities until able to resume in person opportunities.

#### HOW DID HOME VISITS CHANGE DURING COVID-19?

Home visits changed as we were no longer able to go into the homes of the families, Home visits are now done virtually via Zoom, Google Meet, or Facetime. There are options for phone calls, email, or texting if families lack access to technology. Handouts and activities have been provided electronically to families as well as delivered to families' doorsteps with supplies. We have increased our communication and visits during this time and provided increased access to our mental health, nutrition, and health consultants.

#### HOW DID CLASSROOMS CHANGE/OPERATE DURING COVID-19?

All classrooms ceased in-person education during the 3rd through 4th quarter of the 19/20 program year with the exception of Oroville EHS opening up for in-person services in Summer 2020. Classrooms re-opening during the COVID-19 Pandemic operate under guidance from the Department of Health, childcare guidance, our fund sources, and the Centers for Disease Control. Classroom size is reduced. Children are encouraged to wear a mask while in class, and required to wear a mask while riding the bus. Classrooms are rearranged to encourage social distancing among children and deter the sharing of toys. Shared activities and toys such as sandboxes, dress-up clothing, and water tables were removed from the classroom. More outdoor time is encouraged for better airflow, and ventilation is increased in the classroom when possible. Activities in the classroom are planned ahead of time to promote social distancing, along with discussions and activities with children to promote understanding of the new guidelines. During the 2020-21 program year, families may choose to remain in virtual services when their center is operating in person services.
